At SouthPointe School students learned about Indigenous Veterans who served Canada courageously. Classes researched and learned of many sacrifices and heroic bravery. Historical inequality and dedication of Indigenous Veterans as well as specific contributions of Cree Code Talkers. Digital posters of Indigenous Veterans were created to continue building awareness of the continued pursuit of peace.
